Paradise Island

- (1) Lucy White was a very lost young woman when she did something that no sensible person would consider for a moment: She went to live and nearly die on remote Tuin Island in 1981 82 in the employment of an eccentric old bully. Her book about it, *Castaway*, was a best-seller and was made into a film, with Amanda Donohoe playing Lucy. Lucy should really have played herself, for she has her own star quality. Now 45, she radiates an inner power. She is strikingly attractive if surprisingly delicate with a wedge of thick, spun-gold hair piled on top of her head.
- (2) She is the ultimate survivor, because surviving has been her whole life story since her own early childhood. She has to struggle to earn a living for herself and her three sons, so she's become the castaway expert, hired by the BBC as a consultant for their year-long filming of *Castaway 2000* on the Scottish Island, Taransay.
- (3) When her children were still quite young, she wanted them to experience life on a deserted island and decided to spend some time on Pigeon Island. In order to get there, Lucy and her three sons had to make a journey which was more dangerous than Lucy realised until it was too late. They nearly drowned in a canoe on high seas in late spring 1998. She loves her sons and she was determined to give them the island experience that had strengthened her own character. Did it work? 'It helped them see it's not the material things in life that matter. Material things make no one happy. It's people, it's friends, it's yourself.'
- (4) She is not like most other mothers. She sees adventure as a natural part of life, rather than something to be wary of, and she clearly can't live without it. 'I am a mother and father rolled into one for them. At least, I hope so. We can only be the kind of parents we are. No one can turn themselves into some kind of ideal.'
- (5) Certainly, her children will have powerful memories of their remarkable Pacific-island year. 'For them it really was paradise. Children are so adaptable, they quickly think everything that happens to them is normal. They got used to the diet and the primitive conditions. Over the period since the fall of the Berlin Wall and re-unification of Germany, significant changes have taken place in the housing situation in the former East Germany. In order to escape the boxy concrete blocks of the socialist era people are moving out of cities, leaving them to decay and finding new homes in the suburbs.

'Germany is facing the possibility that we will develop real slums, and while that may be normal in other countries, it is completely new for us,' said Heinrich Lehmann, the former mayor of Leipzig. In the last 12 years, more than 1 million new apartment units and houses have been built in the eastern states of the unified Germany, many in new neighbourhoods outside city lines.

The federal government has supported this construction. The rise in home ownership in the suburbs is taking people out of the cities and towns. The problem is made worse by falling population caused by many factors including a 50 per cent drop in the birth rate since German unification.

Today more than a million empty apartments exist in the East, particularly in the cities. Local and federal governments are struggling to avoid the creation of wastelands where some communities are left with a population consisting of only the aging, the unemployed and the law-breakers.

Some villages and small towns are staring at their own death as the average age steadily rises.

Twelve years ago, East Germany had a chronic housing shortage, forcing families across generations to live together in small box apartments in the ugly high-rise blocks that dominate every former Communist city from East Berlin to Moscow. But while adequate housing remains a chronic problem in much of the former Eastern Bloc, eastern Germany faces the opposite situation.

In Leipzig, a city of half a million people, about 60,000 apartments, or 20 per cent of housing units, do not have people living in them, according to local authorities.
